Information:

Reading Standard 2/9/1916 - Killed on August 19th 1916, Age 28. He was the fourth son of the late Mr Frank Bissley and Mrs Bissley of All Saints Avenue, Maidenhead, and husband of Mrs Ethel Muriel Bissley. Lt. Bissley who fell in action while leading an attack on the German trenches. He was a member of a much respected Maidenhead Family. He was a Master at the Essendine School. Paddington. On the outbreak of war he joined the London University O.T.C. and in March 1915 he obtained a Commission in the Royal Berkshire Regiment. He went to the front in August of the same year and was made Brigade Bombing Officer....He leaves a widow and a daughter a week old. His Colonel wrote "...by his death the Regiment has lost a plucky and very popular officer and his work During the fighting deserved high praise".

Berkshire Chronicle 1/9/1916 - Lt. Bissley, played cricket with the Boyne Hill C.C. and Football and Hockey with the Maidenhead Hockey Club, a few seasons ago. At Maidenhead Art School, Modern school and at St Mark's College Chelsea he won many prizes and Diplomas. At the outbreak of war he was about to sit for his final examinations for the degree of B.Sc. London University. For many years he was a member of the choir of All Saints Church, Boyne Hill and a teacher at the Sunday School, he being an earnest church worker. His wife was the granddaughter of the late Rev Cannon Brown.



The October 1916 All Saints Church Parish Magazine reported the death of Mr William Howe Bissley, a cricketer and the 'son of an honoured father'.

More information about William Howe Bissley

The source of this information is the moving book ¹*A Group Photograph* by Andrew Tatham, which has many photographs of William Howe Bissley and his family. I note the page numbers where I have quoted from Andrew's book. A copy of this book has been kindly given to All Saints Church by Andrew Tatham. On my Guided Walks and in my Talks about the soldiers from the Parish of All Saints, Boyne Hill Maidenhead, people were sad to know that William did not live to see his baby daughter. How wonderful to know that he has many descendants.

'William Howe 'Will' Bissley was born on Monday 9th July 1888 in Boyn Hill, Maidenhead, Berkshire, England.' (p. 41) ² He was educated at Maidenhead Art School, Maidenhead Modern School, St Mark's College Chelsea, Birbeck College and the London School of Economics & Political Science.

'When war broke out, he was working as a teacher in London whilst in the final year of his degree at the London School of Economics (determined to be in the best position to provide for his future wife, a girl he had loved since they both set eyes on each other as children in the church choir). He went to France with the 8th Royal Berkshires in August 1915, but didn't go into action with them at Loos as he had been appointed brigade bombing officer... no doubt his abilities as a star local cricketer in Maidenhead stood him in good stead.' (p.41)

On Friday, 8 December 2017 Andrew wrote about William and his marriage to Muriel under the title: ³'An anniversary, and a comfort to the sick': 'Today is the second anniversary of my first chat with Jeremy Vine on the radio. The funny thing is, though, that I have only just recently realised that today is also a very significant anniversary within the story of my project. When I was speaking on the radio about the marriage of Will Bissley to his childhood sweetheart Mu, I was unaware that it was 100 years almost to the hour that their wedding took place. It's amazing that the wedding ever took place. Mu was born in Shrewsbury, 120 miles away, and only moved down to Will's home town of Maidenhead when she was nine, after the death of her father. Even when she joined the church choir and her eyes met Will's the path of true love was not clear. They were of different social backgrounds (her father had been a vicar and his father was a local builder and developer) and in those class-bound times, they were not allowed to talk to each other. They got round this by exchanging little notes via his cassock pocket hanging up in the vestry, and by whispered conversations through her garden fence - and eventually by the time of the War things had developed so that they were able to get married.'

They were engaged at Maidenhead Thicket. 'Will & Mu rode their bicycles to Maidenhead Thicket, a bold adventure when young ladies were supposed to be chaperoned at all times in the company of men. Will had brought with him a selection of rings, on loan from a friend whose father ran the local jeweller's. Mu made her choice and he took the rest back. She wore it for the next 67 years.' (p. 42)

William and Muriel were married on 8th December 1915, (p.42) they 'married in December 1915 and had a 2 day honeymoon in Torquay before he returned to the front. His wife had only seen him once more for a short leave, when in August 1916 she had a premonition that he had died. She went into labour and their daughter was born 4 days after he was killed on the Somme.' (p.41)

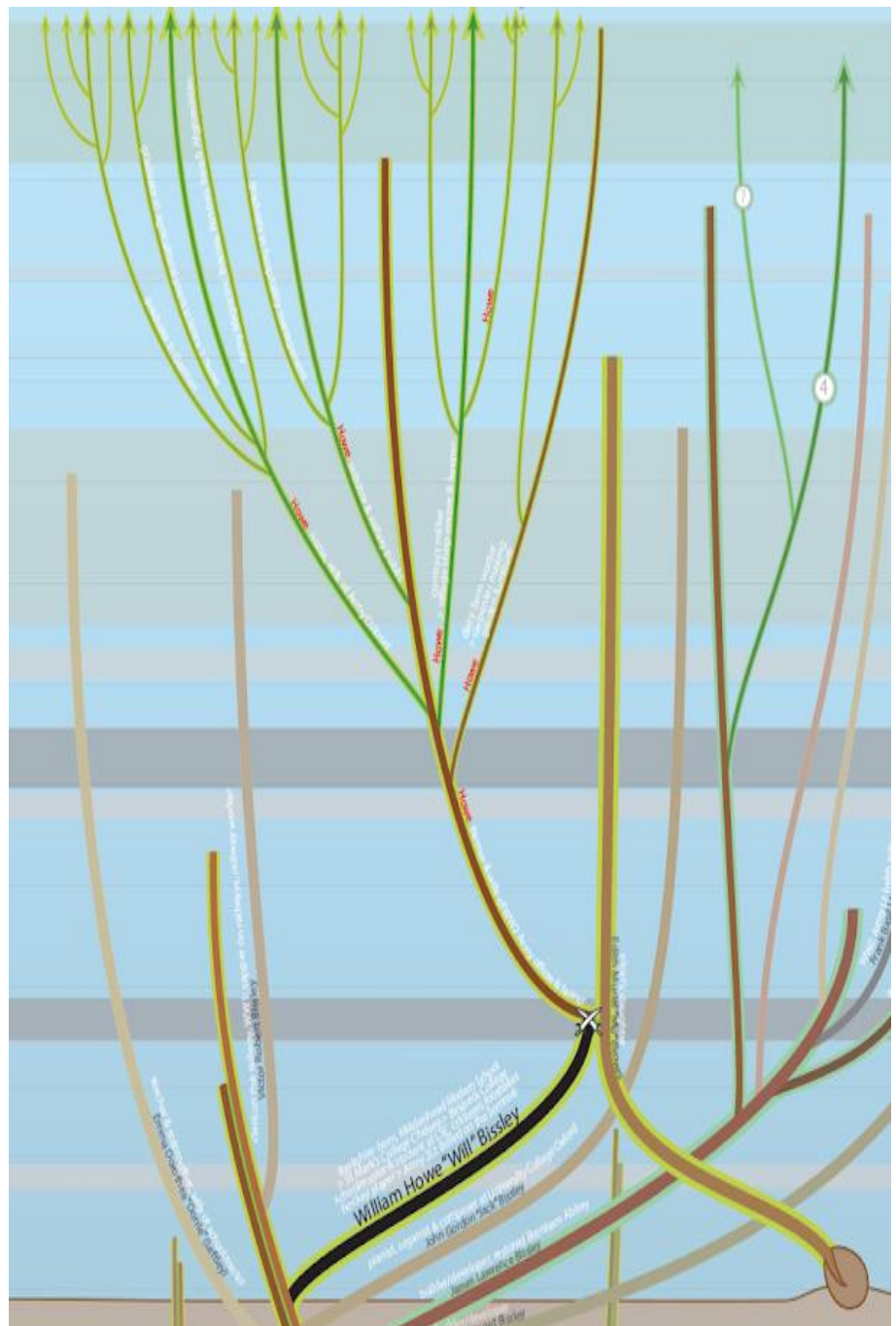

Andrew writes:

⁴I have told the story many times of their brief marriage and the miraculous growth of their family in his absence after the Battle of the Somme, but on their anniversary today I think it is worth remembering the possibilities of life as shown by their family tree.... After Will was killed, you can see his daughter growing to the left and then all the shoots of new generations growing above - 26 lives that couldn't have existed but for their chance meeting.'

Andrew writes: 'From the narrow thread of his short marriage have grown the lives of 4 grandchildren, 8 great grandchildren, and 14 great great grandchildren, including the latest, who was born in March 2015 and christened William John Howe.' (p.41) Andrew wrote in an email to me that he has been in touch with the family and spoke and corresponded with his daughter Betty. How special that he spoke with Betty, the precious daughter of William and Muriel Bissley born at the time of William's death at The Battle of the Somme in August 1916. They lived at Redstone, Rutland Place, Maidenhead'. (p.43)



I have already found that William Bissley's name is on the Remembrance Board at All Saints Church, the Font Cover at All Saints Church, his parents' grave in All Saints Churchyard, the Town Hall in Maidenhead and The Thiepval Memorial. Andrew has found these and 8 more Memorials. ⁵ William Bissley is on these Memorials: London School of Economics; Maidenhead Modern School, now Desborough College; St Mark's College Chelsea, now part of Marjon College Plymouth; Roll of Honour book on display in St Andrew & St Mary's Church, Maidenhead; London County Council, County Hall, Belvedere Rd, Lambeth; in group photograph (unnamed) in the club house of Boyne Hill Cricket Club, Maidenhead; on his wife's grave in the churchyard of St Mary's, East Lydford, Somerset.' Widow Muriel Bissley died in 1982 after celebrating her 90th Birthday with all her family. (p.45)



His name is recorded on Pier and Face 8 C of the Thiepval Memorial on this Panel at the front. Due to scaffolding blocking the way I was not able to go closer to take a clear photograph of his name, but we read his name on this Memorial.

Soldiers billeted in the Parish in the First World War

During the War many soldiers were billeted in Maidenhead and in our Parish for training on local farm land,⁶ at Clivedon and Maidenhead Thicket. Some of the Officers stayed in the Parish of All Saints Boyne Hill at ⁷39 Penyston Road. In December 1914 the Boyne Hill Institute building was made available for the soldiers billeted at Boyne Hill. The February 1915 Parish Magazine tells us that there were 'three Parade Services each Sunday for the soldiers, and it is an inspiring sight to see so many men gathered together for public worship.'

Lieutenant John Walton Bamber⁸ of the 10th Battalion of the Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry was one of the Officers who worshipped at All Saints Church with his men, while they were billeted in Maidenhead for training. John Bamber was born in Natal, South Africa. In 1914 he was studying at St Augustine's missionary training College in Canterbury and when the War started he joined the Army. Sadly he died with his men at Fricourt on 1st July 1916. The crucifix over this pulpit was given in memory of him. We turn on the light over this crucifix when we preach, reminding us that 'we preach Christ crucified;' (1 Cor 1:23) remembering that Jesus died and rose again, showing us resurrection hope, God's love in giving us forgiveness, peace and the assurance of eternal life.

There is an information sheet about John Walton Bamber behind the pulpit and a Memorial to him behind the Curate's Stall to the right of the Lady Chapel. Here is a photograph of that Memorial:
