PARISH NEWS**
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Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

I have in recent times taken on a new role within the Diocese of hosting a group of curates from Reading, Slough, and Windsor over the three years of their curacies. We meet monthly and they are a wonderfully engaging, thoughtful and intelligent group of people who are open to share their experiences of ministry. We recently discussed the subject of funerals. I asked them the question which has been put to me on numerous occasions of who do you think the funeral service is for? There was a mixture of responses some feeling that the funeral was for the deceased, others for the family and friends of the departed loved one and others suggesting it might be for the deceased and their loved ones.

My early experience of officiating at funerals led me to being 'dropped in at the deep end.' My first experience of leading a service was followed by my second and then my third all on the same day! My biggest fear apart from getting through what are emotionally difficult services was getting information confused when taking this number of services in such a short space of time. The first service that day in a funeral parlour in Newport, South Wales was of a former railway man. As I arrived at the service and looked to the back of the parlour, I saw my best friend's father sitting there. I should have guessed as this man had taken me on trains in Rogerstone when I was a young lad growing up as he too had been an engine driver. He was an atheist and his son, and I would discuss as we waited for the bus to school each morning politics, religion, and sport. No idea how our relationship survived but it has to the present day.

That morning leading the service I focussed on this man and felt the need to not only speak about his departed friend but to offer Christian hope to the family and to try to convince my friend's dad that there was truth within the Christian faith. I am not sure that I ever found the words to convince him although the family has asked me back to Wales to officiate at his funeral during my time here in Maidenhead. One of the readings at his service was 'Imagine' by the Beatles. The lyrics go 'Imagine there's no heaven!' Maybe this was his last challenge to me.

My humble response to funerals is that they are for the family, the friends and for the departed loved one. This weekend we will commemorate All Souls and that service provides me with the some of the theology and belief that leads me to share hope at a time of death. The way we share the hope of All Souls is through the Eucharist. When we share in the rites of a funeral of a person we cared about and loved we feel the deepest loss. On Maundy Thursday we discover Jesus who we find in John's Gospel is the one who came among us as a vulnerable baby boy who came to share his life with us and give his life for us. At the Last Supper having washed the feet of his disciples he faces his own death. The early disciples were distraught like many of us at a funeral. The one who brought meaning to life seemed to be heading towards an ending that would put in question whether anything makes sense at all.

We all have times when we question whether our lives have any meaning or purpose. The Last Supper felt like not just the end of one person's life but the end of any sense of meaning for any of us. Yet the Last Supper was the time when Jesus took, blessed, broke, and distributed the bread. 'Do this in memory of me.' Then following the supper Jesus blessed the cup. This meal looked back to the Passover marking the movement from slavery to freedom in the Promised Land. The meal would point forward to the future when we would know Jesus' presence in the breaking of the bread. The meal followed by the watch led to Good Friday and Jesus having experienced desolation and death, then won for us New and Transformed life. On Holy Saturday each year we light the Paschal candle from the Easter fire, the sign that goodness overcomes evil, light shines out of darkness and New Life overcomes death.

In Luke's gospel another story of resurrection took place which I have used many times at funerals. The road and supper at Emmaus had more people lamenting the loss of Jesus on the cross before coming to know Him in the breaking of the bread. With eyes wide open and hearts burning they had experienced the 'Thin place' where Heaven and Earth are joined. The Eucharist is the place of 'Mystical Communion' where, as Fr Nicholas shared on Sunday, all the Saints and all our departed loved ones have gone before us. If we believe Jesus is alive in bread and wine, then we can believe that our loved ones have gone before us to that place we call Heaven. When we share in this Eucharistic meal we are in communion with God, the Saints and all our departed loved ones.

This All Souls Day as we celebrate the Requiem Mass be reminded that the faith, we hold enables us to remember our departed loved ones and to celebrate their new life in the Kingdom. Every funeral liturgy should speak of this hope of New Life for the departed loved one but also hope to all of us of our journey through death to the Heavenly Banquet.

Please sign the names of your departed loved ones on the list prepared by Fr John for the 6pm All Souls Eucharist this Sunday.

May we all share God's love this week,

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 5 NOVEMBER THE FOURTH SUNDAY BEFORE ADVENT

COLLECT

Almighty and eternal God, you have kindled the flame of love in the hearts of the saints: grant to us the same faith and power of love, that, as we rejoice in their triumphs, we may be sustained by their example and fellowship: through Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God now and forever. Amen.

EPISTLE: 1 Thessalonians 2 : 9 – 13

You remember our labour and toil, brothers and sisters; we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you while we proclaimed to you the gospel of God. You are witnesses, and God also, how pure, upright, and blameless our conduct was towards you believers. As you know, we dealt with each one of you like a father with his children, urging and encouraging you and pleading that you lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory. We also constantly give thanks to God for this, that when you received the word of God that you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word but as what it really is, God's word, which is also at work in you believers.

GOSPEL Matthew 24: 1 – 14

As Jesus came out of the temple and was going away, his disciples came to point out to him the buildings of the temple. Then he asked them, 'You see all these, do you not? Truly I tell you, not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down.' When he was sitting on the Mount of Olives, the disciples came to him privately, saying, 'Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign of your coming and of the end of the age?' Jesus answered them, 'Beware that no one leads you astray. For many will come in my name, saying, "I am the Messiah!" and they will lead many astray. And you will hear of wars and rumours of wars; see that you are not alarmed; for this must take place, but the end is not yet. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places: all this is but the beginning of the birth pangs. Then they will hand you over to be tortured and will put you to death, and you will be hated by all nations because of my name. Then many will fall away, and they will betray one another and hate one another. And many false prophets will arise and lead many astray. And because of the increase of lawlessness, the love of many will grow cold. But the one who endures to the end will be saved. And this good news of the kingdom will be proclaimed throughout the world, as a testimony to all the nations;

Operation Christmas Child was formed in 1990 when Dave Cooke from Wrexham saw the horror of children in Romanian orphanages. He asked his friends to help fill a truck with toys and drive it to Romania. OCC is now the world's largest Christmas project run by Samaritan's Purse. Since 1990, more than 168 million children in over 160 countries have experienced God's love through the power of a shoebox of gifts.

Packing shoeboxes for the Operation Christmas Child shoebox appeal has become an important part of our ministry in recent years. This will be our 11th year of taking part and during this time we have donated over 650 shoebox gifts. In the last 3 years, we donated about 60 boxes in each; in 2019 we gave 100!

We plan to follow the same model as last year. There are 3 ways that you can contribute:

Shoebox Online - you can select your gifts online and Operation Christmas Child will pack and send your shoebox for you. We have our own page this year so we can track how many boxes we send. It costs **£20**.



Donation –If you're not keen on the online option, you can make a monetary contribution. You can do this by making an online bank transfer or writing a cheque to the church - or by giving cash. Cheques or cash can be left in the small box for this purpose at the back of church – or give them directly to Jenny. If you can donate

£20, the cost of a full shoebox, that would be great, but smaller donations are gratefully received too. **Please mark any donations clearly as being for the 'Shoebox appeal'.**

Your own shoebox –You could pack your own complete shoebox. Some of you have done this previously. As you may remember, there are some items not allowed and these are listed on the website – and it may give you some inspiration too! The nearest drop off point is Braywick Nurseries, 41 Braywick Rd, Maidenhead SL6 1DX. This will be open from 13th – 20th November. Please don't bring your shoeboxes to the church.
