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Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

I would like to begin this week's Parish News by thanking all those members of our congregation who contributed to helping us open All Saints to the public for the 10 days of mourning following the death of HM Queen Elizabeth II. Over the 10 days we had a small number of people arrive for just about every period of time that we offered. All those that visited the church to write in the book of condolence, light a candle or pray said how important it had been for them to reflect within a beautiful building that offers a wonderful sense of prayer and peace. Thank you too for the bell ringers who rang the bells on the eve of the funeral and at 10.00am on the day of the funeral.

I am sure that we were all moved by the experience of watching the funeral and committal services from Westminster Abbey and St George's Chapel, Windsor. The Archbishop of Canterbury offered a wonderful sermon at the Abbey. His words 'The pattern for many leaders was to be exalted in life and forgotten after death,' but 'The pattern for all who serve God – famous or obscure, respected or ignored – is that death is the door to glory.'

Reflecting on the Queen's speech during Covid, the Archbishop ended with an allusion to a Vera Lynn song, saying 'We will meet again.' It was a sermon that spoke of new Life now and in the Kingdom to come.

On the eve of the funeral Fr John shared with us a beautiful and moving Requiem Eucharist and a good number of people attended. Those that shared the service commented that it was an appropriate way to express the Christian hope in our local church. I shared the following words at the service for those who may wish to read them.

SERMON FOR THE REQUIEM FOR HM QUEEN ELIZABETH II SUNDAY 18 SEPTEMBER 2022

Texts: Lamentations 3: 22-26 and 31-33, 2 Corinthians 4: 16 – 5: 4 and John 6: 35-40

People who do well in life whether that is in business, sport, music, the film industry or running a country, are sometimes asked the question 'What is the secret to their success?' It could equally be what was the bedrock of an ordinary life well lived, perhaps a marriage bringing up your children in a loving, caring and stable environment as we celebrated at the Eucharist in the morning at All Saints.

What motivated you? Where did you find your inspiration and stamina? What guided you? What helped you through the challenging times of struggle and pain? Her Majesty the Queen has been globally praised for doing an outstanding job since she came to the throne at the age of 25. For 70 years she has been our

Queen, Head of the Commonwealth and Supreme Governor of the Church of England with amazing diligence, great grace, intelligence, and humility.

As I quoted in my sermon last week, Tony Blair said the Queen had stability, reassuring presence (Pandemic 2020) and resilience through harrowing times in an extraordinary time of change in the country and the world. In the case of the Queen her motivation was her faith. At her Coronation she vowed to serve God's people as a servant of God and her authority came from God.

In her address of Christmas 2000 the Queen said, 'For me, the teachings of Christ and my own personal accountability before God provide a framework in which I try to lead my life.' In 2008 her message had 'I hope that, like me, you will be comforted by the example of Jesus of Nazareth, who aften in circumstances of great adversity, managed to live an outgoing, unselfish and sacrificial life.' 'He makes it clear that genuine human happiness and satisfaction lie more in giving than receiving, more in serving than in being served.'

I was out with Street Angels last evening and spoke to a man who had waited twelve hours to pay respects to the Queen lying in state. The man said 'I have no faith, and I'm no royalist but the example she set and the feelings I experienced in Westminster Hall were, I guess the nearest I've come to a spiritual/religious experience.

With this in mind, this is why on the Eve of the Queen's funeral service, churches around the countries of the UK and Commonwealth will be celebrating Requiem Masses, or services of thanksgiving and focussing on the faith and hope the scriptures bring.

We begin with Lamentations. The book is a lament of sadness and grief of the ancient city of Jerusalem, destroyed by Babylonians in 587 BC. The Jews cried over the destruction of the Holy City, the loss of their families, their homes, and the place where they believed God was present, the Temple. They wept for their loss and feelings of abandonment. We weep too and lament (we've seen it in church and on our television screens). The loss of continuity and hope in challenging times in a world that at present laments war, climate crisis, and the cost of living crisis. We lament too the loss of our Queen who brought solace.

The Queen has Jesus as her moral compass. When we follow Jesus, we move away from self-sufficiency to solidarity and from hard indifference to compassion. As Lamentations says, 'This I call to mind and therefore I have hope, the steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end, they are new every morning, great is his faithfulness.'

In 2 Corinthians we discover that St Paul is willing to suffer, to sacrifice because he has ultimate hope in the future. 'The best is yet to come.' The Archbishop of Canterbury has said that the Queen was not afraid at the end of her life. I suspect she too knew that the 'Best is yet to come.' The Greeks believed that there's a division between the body and soul, between creation and heaven. It leaves us thinking that the earthly life has little value, but the hope of the Kingdom demands we live life here bringing the glory of heaven. The Queen would quote the Lord's prayer 'Thy Kingdom come on Earth as in Heaven.' Also, Christ will transform our lowly bodies that they become like his glorious body. We will live life caring about each other, seeing each other made in God's image and working in harmony with the new Earth instead of destroying it.

We are celebrating the Eucharist, The Mass, the perfect way to mark the end of life as we hope that we have lived it in the presence of the Risen Lord. Chapter 6 of John's gospel points to the Eucharist. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II valued communion whether in Windsor, Balmoral, Sandringham, and I am sure at many altars.

Jesus in this chapter says 'I am the living bread that came down from heaven. If anyone eats this bread, he will live for ever. The bread that I shall give is my own flesh for the life of the World.' This is Incarnation. John

ch1 14 'the word became flesh and dwelt among us (the Queen spoke of this in numerous Christmas Addresses) and that same flesh is given to us as a living bread. Through our Lord's incarnation and death, we may find New Life. He who feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life. At the Eucharist we experience a foretaste of the Kingdom as we come alongside Jesus and all those who have gone before us.

The Queen at her Coronation when Handel's 'Zadok the Priest was sung, the symbols of the Queen's status were removed, the crimson velvet robe, the diamond diadem, and the coronation necklace. She was left in a simple white dress. She wears a ring but is not giving to a husband but to a people. The archbishop anoints her with Holy Oil to show that she is being set apart to serve and love her people in all her actions, with all her heart and all her mind.

She followed Christ to be set apart not to be served but to serve. Christ sacrificed his life that we might have life in all its fulness. We lament the death of our Queen, but we have hope like St Paul that our lowly bodies will be like God's glorious body and having received the gift of the Living bread we may experience transformed life.

At the end of the sketch that will be forever remembered when the Queen shared tea with Paddington Bear, Paddington was heard to say, "Happy Jubilee, Ma'am, thank you for everything." The Queen's response, "That's very kind."

We may pray Your Majesty Queen Elizabeth II 'Well done good and faithful servant, may you rest in peace and rise in glory.' Amen.

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 2 OCTOBER HARVEST THANKSGIVING COLLECT

Eternal God, you crown the year with your goodness and give us the fruits of the earth in their season: grant that we may use them to your glory, for the relief of those in need and for our own well-being; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

EPISTLE Deuteronomy 26: 1—11

Moses spoke to the people, saying: When you have come into the land that the LORD your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the LORD your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the LORD your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the LORD your God that I have come into the land that the LORD swore to our ancestors to give us.' When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the LORD your God, you shall make this response before the LORD your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, we cried to the LORD, the God of our ancestors; the LORD heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The LORD brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O LORD, have given me.' You shall set it down before the LORD your God and bow down before the LORD your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the LORD your God has given to you and to your house.

GOSPEL John 6: 25 — 35

When they found Jesus on the other side of the sea, the crowd said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' Jesus answered them, 'Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal.' Then they said to Jesus, 'What must we do to perform the works of God?' Jesus answered them, 'This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent.' So they said to him, 'What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, "He gave them bread from heaven to eat."' Then Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.' They said to him, 'Sir, give us this bread always.' Jesus said to them, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.'
