Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

As I write for the latest Parish News I look forward to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting at Boyne Hill Cricket Club. We have over the years tried to make the evening informative, missionary, and social. This year we will hear how our local senior school of Altwood has been blessed by the ministry of The Revd Jo Ellington. Jo will show how the ministry of presence and Christian love can enable young people to be valued. Education is one of our key areas of mission and Jo's input alongside Open the Book Teams, those that welcome schools on visits to the church, those that are governors at schools and the opportunities we have in a wide number of schools to share assemblies enable outreach to young people.

We will hear also about the finances of the church, hear about the 'Day in a Life of a Vicar' and give thanks for the abundant ministry that members of the Body of Christ at All Saints take part in. One of the key areas of ministry is that of 'Welcome'. On the recent conference in Durham looking at how people from around Europe support asylum seekers and refugees we discussed welcome. One of the key areas is how do we enable people to feel welcomed and discover a sense of belonging that might lead to participation within the community. We can see evidence of this when people from Iran take part in welcoming people to church, hand out hymn books and take forward the offertory and take part in Lent lunches by providing soup to raise donations for the Ripple Effect charity in Africa. We note, too, a woman from Iran going out with me this week with Street Angels and a man assisting on a volunteer basis at Thames Hospice. These are examples of welcome leading to belonging.

It is clear that in recent years we are seeing more people from All Saints community and not just our friends from Iran but many new people giving to the community. We will have three new members of the PCC who have not previously been involved and there are growing numbers of people assisting in the various groups within the community and I am delighted to note in the wider community too. David Morgan our Parish Secretary noted the amazing ministry that is shared by parishioners both within the church and in the wider society and felt that it was important to highlight some of those areas of ministry through Parish News. In this edition David directs us in the direction of Boyne Hill Tuesday Club, The Tuesday Lunch Club at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Senior Saints, Maidenhead Care and All Saints Pastoral Care team.

These groups highlight different and complementary models of living the Christian life. Boyne Hill Tuesday Club has for many years provided a wonderful series of varied speakers and events to attract people from within and without All Saints. The Tuesday Lunch Club has over 30 plus years provided a

superb home cooked meal and company to many people from Cox Green and the Parishes of Edmund Campion and All Saints. Senior Saints which grew from Mothers Union continues to share friendship, hospitality and pastoral care to the people who attend. Maidenhead Care with members from All Saints as well as many other churches has provided superb support to people from the wider community of Maidenhead for over 30 years. The Pastoral Care Team of Jeanette Lock, formerly Fr John and I have shared home communion at home and reached out to our local Nursing Homes. All these groups reflect the desire to provide a sense of belonging, community and communion within the community.

Please take time to read the accounts of the ministry of these various groups.

N T READING Acts 8: 26 - 40

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, 'Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.' (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go over to this chariot and join it.' So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: 'Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth.' The eunuch asked Philip, 'About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?' Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?' He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

GOSPEL John 15: 1 – 8

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.'

At our ACPM on Monday evening Ken Smith stood down as Churchwarden after quite a long time; here is note from him:

It has been my privilege and my pleasure to serve All Saints as a Churchwarden for seventeen years altogether, in three separate periods between 1971 and 2024, and in support of three vicars, Fr, Michael Ware, Canon Norman Brown, and Fr Jeremy. On reflection, the first time was more of a warming up period for the following two, as the building work was quite minimal, the ancient oil-fired boiler was behaving itself, and such important matters as Safeguarding, GDPR, Health and Safety and the demands of the charity Commission had yet to be embedded formally into the culture of the church. Also, Statistical returns to the Diocese were minimal, not like now!

Building highlights(?) have included the leak that occurred in the asbestos-covered boiler room, requiring an immediate shut-down of the heating system, the commissioning of a specialist company to remove all the asbestos, and the installation of a new heating system, which itself was not without its problems. Who remembers the huge and very loud heater fan at the back of the church which we had to hire in when it was very cold?

Then there was the stone that a gardener had found lying around at the base of the tower and which he showed to our then architect and me. That discovery led to the repair and restoration of the tower and spire at an estimated cost of £1 million, only made possible by the generous support of Historic England.

And more recently the restoration of the nave floor. All these and many more caused us to sweat buckets and burn the midnight oil at the time but thanks to the work of dedicated and determined people we achieved success each time and the mission of church has been the better for it. I am pleased to have played my part.

Among other top testing, stretching and strengthening issues I would certainly include the Interregnum between Fr. Norman and Fr. Jeremy, and who can forget the Covid period for many reasons.

I have skipped through all these matters and overlooked many more but I do not forget all those I have worked with and socialised with on the way, and still do, and not least I have enjoyed, and do enjoy, working in particular with the Welcome Group, the Sustainability `Group, and the Stewardship Group.

It has also been so rewarding to help and befriend our Iranian colleagues.

I, of course, relinquish my role with mixed emotions, but it is time to hand on the baton and I know that John and Steve are worthy carriers. I am of course not going anywhere and shall still be available to help in any way that my experience allows me to. I just have to find somewhere else to sit!
