Dear Friends and Parishioners of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

On the 6th Sunday of Easter, we had the text from John 5: 1-9 of a man who waited 38 years to be healed! The text set me on the following journey as we baptised Shadan, an asylum seeker from Iran.

At 17 years of age in November 1982 I began work at South Wales Electricity Board. My mother had worked at St Mellon's, Cardiff from the early 1970's to help to afford to bring up my brother Tim and me. My mother had excellent support from my grandparents and later from the church community of St John's, Rogerstone.

I remember working summer jobs at the office in St Mellon's. I was quite happy having a little money, and able to go out on the town in Newport and very occasionally Cardiff with a few friends visiting pubs and nightclubs. On that November day in 1982 I recall being asked alongside a handful of other new beginners at the Board to meet with Roy Jenkins who I believe was the Deputy Chief Accountant of SWEB at the time. Roy Jenkins was old school; you worked hard to achieve and indeed this man had an impressive career. The only words I recall from the meeting were things like did I know anything about the electricity industry and why was I seeking a career in accounts? From memory I failed to utter a single word in response! As I left the room Mr Jenkins put a hand on my shoulder and said, 'Don't ever get a chip on your shoulder son.'

Although Roy Jenkins was a highly professional man, I don't think he was a prophet. However, nearly 8 years later and only one promotion following many interviews I was blaming other people. I was on one occasion offered a promotion to the heady heights of CA6 from CA4. The interview being slightly less disastrous than normal (I may have uttered one or two answers clearly on this occasion.) led to me being asked by one of the interviewers, "Jeremy, would you like this position on what will be a new department or wait a month or two and gain the promotion where you are?" I chose to stay and needless to say didn't get the position later when the post where I worked came up. I can recall blaming the manager at the time for offering me the later post! Of course, the truth was that I was showing a lack of enthusiasm and highlighting lethargy. Yes, I studied but not with much enthusiasm, passed the ONC and HNC studies but I was never going to pass professional accountancy exams because deep down I had no desire. Instead, I blamed others.

Compare that attitude with a female priest who is taking on the role of animator/ facilitator for the Oxford Diocese. Some of the animators were lamenting that curates seem unable to fix their diaries. How are they going to run parishes said one animator? This led to a discussion on the thought that many new curates are neuro diverse. The female priest retorted, wait a minute. 'I am neuro diverse. I could barely put together a sentence when I felt called to the priesthood.' I had to learn techniques to survive to be able to answer God's call.'

In the Gospel of St John chapter 5: 1-9 we discover John telling us about a pool called Bethesda. Around the pool (Which I visited on Pilgrimage in 2009) the sick gather to wait for the movement of water. It was viewed as a place of angelic presence as the waters were troubled. This was perhaps a sign of the Holy Spirit, of the divine breaking through to the human need, of light breaking through the darkness. The first person who

By the pool a man was found who had been ill for 38 years. When the man is asked by Jesus do you want to be made well, his answer is not yes but instead he blames others. Pope Francis in his book, 'A Gift of Joy And Hope' writes 'The man's sickness and sin is pessimism, sadness and apathy.' He spent 38 years complaining about others and has done nothing to help himself. As I said to the congregation when I was preaching this message I would have loved this man to have met my mother! My mother would have said 'smile and the world smiles with you, cry and you cry alone.' My mother could be incredibly infuriating if you were seeking sympathy that she felt her sons were not deserving of. Maybe the reason for this side of her character was that she had overcome huge hurdles and problems with the help of my grandparents, the church and some kind people at SWEB. My mother had worked hard and learned to drive a car to make sure we were looked after. Admittedly it had at times been nerve-wracking in the car when my mother first took to the roads but that led to us going to football matches and holidays in Dorset and Hampshire.

Pope Francis in his book leads us to another healing story in John 9. Here, a man born blind is overjoyed upon his healing and spoke to the doctors of the law defending Jesus not once, not twice but three times. His parents are asked who healed him on the sabbath but although admitting he was their son denied knowing Jesus. Their son however knows costly grace and defends the man who has healed him.

Francis says 'Fog surrounds the soul and suffocates it. Modern people have become used to this fog, greyness living with no hope, expectations or joy'. Back to John 5 and the man who, even when he is healed, doesn't exactly shout or dance for joy and in verse 15 points the finger at Jesus when the doctors of the law asked who cured him.

Some famous people of the church (Tertullian and Chrysostom) seek a baptismal motif in this story. Maybe, maybe not but Francis sees that water is strength and life. Jesus certainly used it to regenerate through baptism. Washing, cleansing, life enhancing. Apathy is a neutral sin writes Francis, perhaps like Dietrich Bonhoeffers 'Cheap Grace' as against his 'Cost of Discipleship' Costly Grace.

The joy of the person healed in chapter 9 is not found through material wealth or things. True joy is born out of encounter. Only last week Bishop Mary recounted how she had told a group of teenagers that she was on Facebook and Instagram. One student said don't worry about that, we want authentic encounters. Speak with us. Living in relationship with others, a feeling of being accepted, understood and loved is what young people desire. It is hearing someone say, 'You are important to me.' It is hearing Jesus say at our baptism 'You are my beloved son/daughter.' Dare we say in our church it is asylum seekers /refugees getting up and walking. Realizing that they live in troubled times and are seeking a better life. Shadab, as you have left your family and your country to seek a better life, I hope that on this your baptism you can hear the words of Jesus, "You are my beloved daughter", and live this life with joy and hope and not with pessimism, sadness and apathy left to blame only others.

May you all be blessed by God's love this Ascensiontide and Pentecost,

NT READING Acts 1: 1 - 11

In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This,' he said, 'is what you have heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now.' So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.'

GOSPEL: Luke 24: 44 — 53

Jesus said to the disciples, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you — that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high.' Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshipped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; and they were continually in the temple blessing God.

NT READING Acts 2: 1 - 21

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in their native language. Amazed and astonished, they asked, 'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs – in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power.' All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?' But others sneered and said, 'They are filled with new wine.' But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, 'Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: "In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.""

GOSPEL John 14: 8 – 17

Philip said to Jesus, 'Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied.' Jesus said to him, 'Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, "Show us the Father"? Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it. If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you for ever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you.
