Dear Friends and Parishioners of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

I have noticed that the Church Times newspaper has over the last few years asked clergy and indeed lay people to write 'NOTEBOOK' or 'PARISH DIARY'. Yours truly will not claim to write with the quality of reporting that the gifted authors of such pieces that the Church Times is blessed with, but I do think occasionally it is worthwhile sharing ministry within the parish.

I begin with the joyful ministry of sharing baptism and wedding services at All Saints. It is true that we are not officiating at the number of weddings a parish like All Saints once would have hosted. This year we will have only had four wedding services as people choose other venues, sometimes abroad. I recall in 2019 enjoying the beautiful beaches of Mexico with a cold beer and the latest Robert Harris novel in hand as in the background a couple from South Wales got married in the background!

The two weddings we had this week were beautiful occasions to celebrate. The first provided an opportunity for a curate from Windsor to lead his first wedding. Adam led the service thoughtfully, calmly leading the couple through their vows and exchange of rings. Adam's first wedding was in stark contrast to my first wedding in SS Julius & Aaron church, Newport where my first attempt rivalled the 'Four Weddings and a Funeral' classic. Rowan Atkinson's part would have possibly increased in hilarity had the script writers witnessed my efforts whereby through my nervous energy the man answered the vows in the female name and vice versa! Fortunately, we did get everything correct in the end although the brides father did have to remind me (in a tone that suggested he had had quite enough of the bloke in the clerical collar, and he now needed a stiff drink) that I had forgotten the second hymn.

The second wedding on Saturday began with a baptism. The couple's son was baptised into the Body of Christ, and we reflected that he might be brought up within the family of God knowing that he is loved and valued by God. Following the baptism, we heard the couple share vows, and exchange rings and receive God's blessing and we prayed that they might bring out the best in each other and provide a loving family home for their child. Reflecting on Paul's letter to the Galatians as I prepared my sermon on Saturday, I noted just how far we still struggle to live believing that through our baptism we are all one in Christ. No Jew no Gentile, No male and female, no slave or free but we are all one in Christ Jesus. Sadly, we struggle to reflect this belief within the church never mind within the world. This was brought home to me as I listened to the Revd Jo Ellington lead a bible study on the parable of the Good Samaritan with about a dozen students at Altwood School. It was upsetting to hear that at least half of the students had experienced racial abuse.

Returning to a theme of joy I shared last week three confirmation classes with Iranians on zoom, four teenagers and a parent on Wednesday evening and a group of younger students watching 'Super book' a collection of DVD stories based on bible events on Sunday. This week we were looking at baptism and the story of Passover. The children seem to love the biblical presentations, and many have a good grasp of the bible stories. The only problem was that the vicar had promised chocolate cake and promptly forgot the trip to Tesco's!

Continuing the theme of bible stories two teams at Larchfield School and All Saints School shared the resurrection story and the hope of new life. All Saints congregation alongside other churches have provided wonderful bible presentations for fifteen years and they are received with joy. Perhaps the creative storytelling has contributed to the knowledge of God's love for His people through this wonderful ministry.

One of the gifts of ministry is sharing communion with people at home. The opportunity to share the breaking of bread and pouring or wine, the gift of new and transformed life is a humbling experience. One of the couples Jeanette and I have shared with over the years ae Reg and Silvia Denison. These two people married for 67 years having met at a youth club in South Africa, always hand in hand, loving one another and blessed with an equally loving family died within a week of each other. In the case of Reg, he died peacefully and entered the joy of the Kingdom as I in the company of members of his family prayed the last rites. May this loving couple who contributed so much to the church community over the years rest in peace and rise in glory.

On Thursday morning I shared morning prayer and bacon sandwiches with curates from the Reading Archdeaconry. They are a gifted group of men and women who have reached the point in their ministry where they desire to use their talents to share their calling with others. The professional dancer and lecturer who was married on Saturday provided an example to these curates. By learning the basic steps of dance, you can be confident to use your creativity and flair, but this only happens when we have the basics of life embedded.

Some of our friends who have received the right to stay in this country have been finding jobs and homes to live in. Within our parish I was delighted to bless the flat of one of our couples. Alongside the joy of their new home though we prayed for their families in Iran who they are worried about and who they are unable to make contact with as the internet is down in their country. As we reflect upon Iran we think too of people in our church community from Lebanon, Israel, Russia, Ukraine, South Sudan and Nigeria where war and conflict are found and loved ones made vulnerable.

Finally, I share with you my meeting with my spiritual director. He is a wise man and as I shared my hope of taking a sabbatical in the summer of 2027, he asked me to reflect on T.S Eliot's 'Coming back to the beginning and finding afresh.' He suggested too the search for the inner journey and the outward pilgrim journey of the Celtic tradition as a place to look back over my life. Most importantly Nicholas advised to have a little fun, be playful rather than seeing the sabbatical as a time of effort.

To conclude this week and reflect I thank God for the diversity of our congregation. We are truly blessed to know people as neighbours and not strangers.

May you all be blessed by God's love this Ascensiontide and Pentecost,

N T READING Acts 12: 1-11

About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.) When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him. The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, 'Get up quickly.' And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, 'Fasten your belt and put on your sandals.' He did so. Then he said to him, 'Wrap your cloak around you and follow me.' Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, 'Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting.'

GOSPEL Matthew 16: 13 - 19

When Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.'

Almighty God, you have broken the tyranny of sin and sent the Spirit of your Son into our hearts whereby we call you Father: give us grace to dedicate our freedom to your service, that we and all creation may be brought to the glorious liberty of the children of God; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit one God, now and for ever. Amen

EPISTLE Galatians 6: 7 – 16

Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith. See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised — only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule — peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

GOSPEL Luke 10: 1 – 11, 16 - 20

The Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you." But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, "Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near." Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me.' The seventy returned with joy,

saying, 'Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!' He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven.'

DOING THE SMALL THINGS WELL

A small change. I read something that rather shocked me in the 10th May New Scientist. Researchers have discovered that tiny bits of plastic in the food chain are now to be found in the brains of mice and they are changing their natural behaviours. Received wisdom is that the blood-brain barrier keeps our brains safe from contaminants, but this research is raising the question of how much is getting into the brains of our children as they develop, and what the long term effect will be.

These tiny bits of plastic are sadly unavoidably eaten and drunk by all of us, but we can minimise our exposure by avoiding plastic water bottles, cling film or re-heating food in plastic containers. So a small change to metal water bottles, glass lemonade bottles, ceramic or clay containers to reheat things etc could make a significant difference over time, both to us and to our children and grandchildren.
