Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

The Wonder of God's Presence in the World



Sometimes we can be stunned by the night sky on a dark, crysta- clear night. The more we look, the more we can see the pin-pricks of light from stars millions and millions of light-years away, and soon the whole sky seems to be filled with stars and galaxies. We can be overwhelmed by a sense of the beauty and shear boundless scale of the created universe, set alongside the smallness of ourselves and our day to day lives. There is the apparent simplicity of it all, just points of white light against dark-black darkness — and then we remember the complexity hidden even within our own little planet, the complexity of chemical reactions, of weather systems, mountain-building and ocean depths; of life from the smallest cell to the largest mammal;

and of course, the complexity hidden within each one of us, the chemical and biological systems that cause us to grow and develop, to keep ourselves alive, and to enable us to be sentient, thinking and feeling human beings capable of so much creativity and goodness. Many, many people find the sight of the night-sky a moving, thought-provoking and compelling sign of God's presence.

As the Psalmist says:

"What is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him?" (Ps 8)

I am writing this piece the day after we had a service of Benediction, where we particularly focus on the presence of Jesus Christ with us in the Holy Sacrament of the Altar – the bread and wine which, at the command of Jesus Christ and through the power of the Holy Spirit, becomes the living presence of Jesus Christ in our midst, and which we take into ourselves when we receive Holy Communion. Hence, we keep a candle perpetually lit alongside the place in All Saints Church where the Sacrament is reserved – the presence with us of Christ in this unique and special way. Another sign of the wonder of God's presence with us.

Jesus Christ longs to be close with us throughout our day, from the moment we wake to the time we lay our head down on our pillow. He loves us so much that he died on the cross for us – how could he not want to be with us? The God who created absolutely everything, the stars and the planets, the birds and the bees, and you and me – he offers himself to us in love and compassion, not judging us but wanting to lift us up and help us to be the best person we can be. The purpose of worship, especially the Eucharist and receiving Holy Communion, is to set time aside to more consciously be in the presence of Christ so that we can be sustained

and strengthened by him and encouraged and guided to share that love and compassion and joy to those around us. To try and live the Christian life without being grounded and sustained through worship in this way is to live life with one hand tied behind our backs.

As we go out into the world, we don't leave God behind but we go with him into the world; the more we know him in worship, the more we can recognise him with us in our daily prayers and bible reading, in the ways in which we share love with those around us, the ways in which we bring care, love and compassion to those who need it today, the ways in which we find God's presence in the awe and wonder of creation.

Being touched with the presence of God in our worship, we are made aware of how wonderful it is to be in his presence. And the more we share in worship, the more we can notice the wonder of God's presence with us in the rest of our lives – and finding it, we can celebrate and enjoy.

EPISTLE Philippians 1: 21 - 30

For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain. If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labour for me; and I do not know which I prefer. I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better; but to remain in the flesh is more necessary for you. Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, so that I may share abundantly in your boasting in Christ Jesus when I come to you again. Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, and are in no way intimidated by your opponents. For them this is evidence of their destruction, but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ, but of suffering for him as well — since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

GOSPEL Matthew 20: 1 - 16

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire labourers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the labourers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the market-place; and he said to them, "You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right." So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, "Why are you standing here idle all day?" They said to him, "Because no one has hired us." He said to them, "You also go into the vineyard." When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, "Call the labourers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first." When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, "These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat." But he replied to one of them, "Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?" So the last will be first, and the first will be last.'

GREEN NEWS

As St James said 'Faith without works is dead' (James 2: 26) and one of the many ways we as a Church are demonstrating our faith is through gaining the Eco-Church Bronze Award. What do we mean by this? As a congregation we are showing our love for God through our care and respect for the people and world that He so loves.

We are all becoming very familiar with what we as a Church body are doing, but we are also very aware that all of us as individuals are doing a huge amount in our daily lives. It would be great to share these things with each other and so inspire each other. With that in mind we are planning to put out a short survey so we can let you all see the 'big picture' of all the great things going on. It'll take the form of four short questions to fill in (anonymously) at the start or end of a Sunday/Wednesday service. We want to know what you're doing to reduce waste (eg use a re-fillable water bottle rather than wasting plastic by buying a single use one); what you're doing to reuse or repurpose things (eg the old wardrobe is now a cupboard in the garage); what you recycle (eg taking books & clothes to the charity shop); and what charities you support to help the planet (eg water-aid).

These suggestions are just the tip of the iceberg to get you thinking!

When we have noted all the wonderful things you're doing we'll put a summary into the Weekly Newsletter. Maybe there will be some things you never thought of! We'll also use the summary to help us in our application for the Eco-Church Silver Award.

HELP FOR ASYLUM SEEKERS URGENTLY NEEDED

You have probably heard that the government is in the process of mass-granting asylum to asylum seekers. This is good news but presents a short-term problem. People granted asylum have to leave their accommodation within 7 days of the grant. It means we are expecting up to 100 people to become homeless in Maidenhead in the next few weeks. It has already started and we expect to have around 30 people on the streets by next week.
