MAIDENHEAD
PARISH NEWS**
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Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

On the 27 April, Rod Broad, and Sibö and Darren Pimm and myself took part in a morning with Bishop Olivia at Dedworth church on the subject of children's, families and youth ministry. Bishop Olivia began the morning by saying that each of God's creation is precious and of infinite value. Young people are not to be seen as resources but as children of God. We must value and care for children and young people. With this view in mind Olivia challenged churches to have in place toddler groups, children's groups, youth clubs, baptism and confirmation classes, develop contact with schools and encourage the young to become disciples.

The Church of England has largely lost contact with the young and we need to discover the missing generations. We were asked the question has the church lost young people to the I-phone? As Altwood School has as its vision we need to encourage children to live life in all its fulness. To be able to live life in all its fulness children and young people need community, guidance and self-belief and value. Rod, Sibö and I will be meeting shortly to consolidate the ideas from Dedworth and then encourage those people we have at All Saints who desire children's and young people's ministry to grow to meet to plan the pathway to a deeper relationship with the missing generations.

I preached on the 5 May at All Saints the following sermon.

'I joined a packed audience of people at the Maidenhead Synagogue to hear the latest speaker of the Berkshire Council of Christians and Jews on Wednesday evening. the guest speaker was Shaun Fletcher, BBC presenter on Countryfile, Sunday Morning Live and Songs of Praise. He is an ambassador for both Beating Bowel Cancer and Young Minds UK. The title of his talk was his life, religious journey, passionate causes and media roles.

Shaun Fletcher turned out to be an excellent speaker and a very honest and humble man. He spoke movingly of his mother's death through bowel cancer, which she had kept quiet from him until near the end of her life. His son's struggle with Obsessive Compulsive Disorder, and his need of support from Psychiatric hospitals was also shared. Shaun's faith journey was encouraged by a close friend who took him to All Souls in London to take part in the 'Christian Explored' course. He found faith and 'gave his life to God'. Shaun married a Welsh lady and due to the fact, that following a few drinks at his wedding he had promised to learn Welsh he did just that with the support of BBC Wales in Cardiff where he worked in journalism and presenting.

Shaun mentioned that at points in his life he had been 'Chasing the wrong thing until he found faith'. At question time I asked him on the basis of his support for 'Young Minds UK', the fact that his son suffered with mental issues and that he himself had 'chased the wrong things' what advice could he give me for an assembly at Altwood School that I was giving on the subject of wellbeing and compassion? Does the image of the media send out the wrong messages to young people? It was a similar question that I asked Richard Coles, musician,

priest and writer about the validity of a celebrity priest? Coles struggled in his reply, but Fletcher was honest. He said 'I understand your question but you not going to find the answers that you might want from me. He felt that young people go through phases of life. He himself 'wished he had known then what he knew now.'

It is an important subject and the local school know this only too well. My assembly for what it is worth had singing in the shower, a walk with my friend John from Reading to Silchester, (Physical activities are great for mental wellbeing), watching a film (The story of Amy Winehouse though not a good example of a life of wellbeing), and reading a good book in my case the Richard Harris novel about Vesuvius. Other examples included drawing a picture, dancing, and keeping oneself hydrated. Drawing, dancing, and drinking more water do not feature highly on my gifting or my priorities in life but you see the importance of these activities.

The school in their assembly title to me had linked wellbeing with compassion. I looked back on my life (As I had been encouraged to do in Durham with people working with Asylum Seekers around Europe) and shared how teachers at school, an excellent church youth club with relationships of trust were formed and the people who influenced my vocation had played an important part in my life. I shared with the students the walk I took through Sunderland which was to act as a 'Mirror' upon my life, the woman at 'Sunshine Corner' who gave community, connectedness and encouragement to a Pakistani family waiting 19 years for Asylum, and other people from Russia, and South Africa. She employed a young man with Downs Syndrome' and the lady from Pakistan. The shop owner gave me a leaflet 'My Sisters Kitchen' a community food project 'We rise by lifting others.' Cooking as a tool to educate, empower and connect. This would aim to help peoples with well-being and self-esteem>

On the 22nd May our Welcome group will meet to return to looking at the course 'Everybody Welcome.' This course looks at welcome leading to belonging. The challenge the Church of England is facing is how do we make children, families and young people feel welcomed leading to belonging? Once Darren, Sibio and Rod have met we will send an invitation to Sundays @4 leaders, Young Saints and Tiny Saints leaders and any other interested parties to discover our next steps. Mei our new PCC member and helper at Tiny Saints mentioned how her friends at St Mary's, St Peter's and St Luke's have plenty of activities for families and young people. As you can read in the reports that David Morgan has attached to this edition of Parish News we do provide Tiny Saints, Young Saints and Sundays @4, alongside Open the Book, assemblies, classes, church visits, governorships, and partnership with Jo Ellington (Chaplain in Altwood) in schools. However, the deep relationships I had through a church youth club is not part of our offering.

John's gospel continues the theme of the true vine, the farmer, and the branches, where we can love our neighbour and produce 'fruit that will last!' God gives life sustained and transformed by the vine (Jesus) and the sap (The Holy Spirit) that produces fruit. Catherine of Sienna discerned from prayer that she could not give back love to God as he had given her. All she could do was love her neighbour to show her love for God.

Bear Grylls who is a lead for the Scout movement says 'connectedness, belonging are at the heart of human living'. You can be a billionaire but without friends, family and community you are not rich. Grylls says society demands that we are 'sorted'. If we are constantly on I phones looking for hearts, thumbs up signs, and numbers of followers what life does that bring? If we truly know God's love, we can be the people God desires us to be.

We are a welcoming community, though not all who visit this church find belonging. Faith gives us a relationship with the God of love, forgiveness, and kindness because it is rooted in the vine and nourished by the sap. Can we discover a way of sharing that relationship with the young?

There are some pictures at the back of church. Young people at Sundays @4 have drawn the vine and the hands of connectedness and then written about the people they are praying for. Following the drawing and painting we prayed using incense for the needs they had brought forth. One young person had drawn a man giving flowers to a woman. I asked him his prayer intention. He said, 'There are too many lonely people in the world.'

As the humble Shaun Fletcher said, 'there's no easy answers but we should desire to try and share the journey.' This may lead to fruit that will last and young people, children and families may find belonging within the church.

If you are not able to support ministry to the young practically, please pray for the ministry to families, children, young people and our schools.

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 12 MAY AFTER ASCENSION DAY

COLLECT

Grant, we pray, almighty God, that as we believe your only-begotten Son our Lord Jesus Christ to have ascended into the heavens, so we in heart and mind may also ascend and with him continually dwell; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit one God, now and for ever. Amen.

N T READING Acts 1: 1 – 11

In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them over the course of forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While staying[a] with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This', he said, 'is what you have heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with[b] the Holy Spirit not many days from now.'

The Ascension of Jesus

So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.'

GOSPEL Luke 24: 44 -

Jesus said to the disciples, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you – that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high.' Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshipped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; and they were continually in the temple blessing God.

N T READING Acts 2: 1 – 21

The Coming of the Holy Spirit

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, 'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia,

Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God’s deeds of power.’ All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, ‘What does this mean?’ But others sneered and said, ‘They are filled with new wine.’

Peter Addresses the Crowd

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them: ‘Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o’clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

“In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord’s great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.”

GOSPEL John 15: 26 - 27 & 16: 4b—15

Jesus spoke to his disciples: ‘When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who comes from the Father, he will testify on my behalf. You also are to testify because you have been with me from the beginning. I have said these things to you so that when their hour comes you may remember that I told you about them. I did not say these things to you from the beginning, because I was with you. But now I am going to him who sent me; yet none of you asks me, “Where are you going?” But because I have said these things to you, sorrow has filled your hearts. Nevertheless I tell you the truth: it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. And when he comes, he will prove the world wrong about sin and righteousness and judgement: about sin, because they do not believe in me; about righteousness, because I am going to the Father and you will see me no longer; about judgement, because the ruler of this world has been condemned. I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you.’
